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Introduction

Thirteen years have passed since the beginning of the longest recessionary period in the economic history of Puerto Rico. This difficult period under recession, has been characterized by long-standing and structural problems, seems endless, and a challenge to the labor market. Analyzing economic projections year after year, the expected recovery seems to move away. Under that scenario, the destructive impact of hurricanes Irma and María in September of 2017, multiple earthquakes mainly in the southern region in the beginning of 2020, and the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, aggravated the crisis. In particular, Hurricane María produced an unprecedented damage to Puerto Rico, to the people and to businesses. For the economy, that meant a increase in the gross national product (GNP) in real terms of only 1.5% in fiscal year 2019, a decreasing trend since fiscal year 2013. At the same time, Hurricane María aggravated the declining population levels since 2005. The population of Puerto Rico for 2019 reached 3.19 million, almost the same level as in 1979. From 2010 to 2019, more than half a million people emigrated, mainly to United States. From 2017 to 2018, net migration registered the highest loss with 123,399. However, from 2018 to 2019 the net migration registered positive international migration, with 7,773 people. Migration, specially of young productive individuals, has been taking a leading role in the structure of the general population. Also, the ageing of population has put pressure on those who develop public economic policy, with the question regarding the composition of the current workforce, should the current pace continues.

In mid-March, the government of Puerto Rico issued Executive Order number OE-2020-023 that contemplated the closure of both the government and private companies. It then issued other executive orders that were gradually opening and changing the measures to address the situation of the COVID -19 pandemic. In September 25,2020, Puerto Rico had positive COVID-19 cases of 23,357 with confirmed molecular test; of 24,065 probable positive cases according serological tests; 648 death; and 339 hospitalized. The unemployment rate during the COVID-19 pendemic for the months of May and June reached the figures of 9.6% and 8.5%, respectively. If we compare that with the same months of the previous year, (7.7% and 8.0%) then is an increase of 1.9 and .05 percentage points, respectively. The week ending on 4/4/20 was the week when more initial claims were reported in Puerto Rico with 66,555 claims, in comparison with the week when Hurricane Maria claims were reported on the week ending 4/11/2017 with 8,281 claims. The highest insured unemployment rate in the week ending June 27 was in Puerto Rico (26.8), in Nevada (20.9), in Hawaii

(19.9), in New York (17.0), in Louisiana (16.6), in California (15.9), in Massachusetts (15.6), in Connecticut (15.2), in Georgia (14.1), and in Rhode Island (14.0).


After Hurricanes Irma and María (almost 40,000 jobs were lost), and after multiple Earthquakes and now with the COVID-19 pandemic a large number of jobs have been lost. However, we have observed that after the recovery from Hurricanes Irma and Maria, unemployment declines again after the Earthquakes and COVID-19 pandemic, when analyzing major industry sectors. A nonfarm payroll employment loss of 1.7% in fiscal year 2020, may be compared with an increase of 1.9% in fiscal year 2019, and the loss of 3.7% in fiscal year 2018. Also, for the same period, only three major sector industries showed growth, Education & Health Services 1.7%, Financial Activities 1.1% and Manufacturing, 0.9%. Otherwise, major sector industries showed the most significant loss: Trade, Transportation and Utilities 6.5%; followed by Professional and Business Services 5.1%; Leisure and Hospitality 3.1%; Mining, Logging & Construction, 2.7%; Information .05% and Other Services .01%. In general, nonfarm payroll employment in the private sector showed a decrease of 14.2% in fiscal year 2020, compared with an increase of 24.4% recorded in fiscal year 2018, and the loss of 20.8% in fiscal year 2018. Government employment dropped by 0.6%. This sector has registered consecutive falls in the last 10 years.


This report shows an examination of Puerto Rico's economy and workforce during FY 2019-2020. Statistical data is from official sources such as, Puerto Rico Planning Board, US Census Bureau and the Puerto Rico Department of Labor and Human Resources. The three main topics presented in this report are: economy, demography and labor market. The first section presents the economy section shows an analysis of contain principal economic variables such as, gross national product (GNP), gross domestic product (GDP), personal income and personal consumption expenditures, among others. The demography section shows an analysis of population by age and gender, population projections, and population by age group in Local Workforce Development Areas. Finally, the broader topic is the one related to the labor market, with an analysis of the labor force; employment and unemployment; composition of employment by industry sector; Business Employment Dynamics (BED), occupational employment data; in-demand skills; long-term industry and occupational projections; and Weekly Claims for Unemployment Insurance Data & Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed.

II. Overview of the Economy

A. Principal Macroeconomics Variables

In FY 2019 Puerto Rico's real gross national product (GNP) increased by 1.5% (Figure 1), then a downward trend was registered from FY 2006 to FY 2018, interrupted in FY 2012, when there was a slight increase of 0.5%. In terms of the aggregate demand, the components that showed an increase were: government consumption expenditure (10.2%), and personal consumption expenditure (5.6%); and Otherwise, where an decrease was observed in construction investment (14.8%); net sales to the rest of the world (7.6%); and gross domestic fixed investment (2.2%).




Figure 2 Gross Domestic Product - Current Prices (millions of dollars - fiscal years)

The gross domestic product (GDP), the output of goods and services produced by labor and property located in Puerto Rico, showed an increase of 4.0% in current prices for FY 2019 (Figure 2). This variable has been recording falls in FY 2017 and FY 2018 fiscal years. The sectors of GDP that registered an increase in FY 2019 when compared with FY 2018 were: Utilities (19.4%); Transportation and Warehousing (16.0%); Art, Entertainment and Recreation (13.8%); Mining (7.4%); Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (7.2%); Other Services (6.2%); Management of Companies and Enterprises (5.7%); Accommodation and Food Services (4.3%); Manufacturing (4.0%); Construction (3.8%); Real Estate and Rental (3.5%); Health Care and Social Services (3.5%); Wholesale Trade (3.1%); Finance and Insurance (2.6%); Information (2.4%); Educational Services (2.3%); Retail Trade (2.2%); and Agriculture (0.1%). Sectors that showed contractions were: Government (4.6%), and Administrative Services and Support (1.8%).

The main sectors of Puerto Rico's economy, in terms of production and income, are manufacturing and services. Manufacturing, is the main contributor to the GDP, has undergone fundamental changes over the years, as a result of increased emphasis on higher-wages, high-technology industries, such as, pharmaceuticals, biotechnology, professional and scientific instruments; and certain high technology machinery and equipment. Manufacturing in Puerto Rico, basically concentrates in certain major industries: pharmaceuticals and medicine; and chemical manufacturing. In FY 2019 this sector generated \$49,392.1 millions or 47.0% of the GDP. The service sector plays an important role in the economy, not only for its contribution to the GDP, but because of its leads in the private sector, in terms of employment. In FY 2019, this sector produced \$44,685.2 millions and the share of the total GDP was 42.6% (Table 1).




Figure 3 Personal Income - Constant Prices (millions dollars - fiscal years)

Personal income, in real terms, registered a decrease of 3.8% in FY 2019, reflecting a loss when compared to FY 2018. This variable is composed of employee compensation, proprietor income and transfer payments. The share of each one, as a part of personal income in FY 2019 was 39.6%, 24.0% and 43.2%, respectively (Figure 3).

In FY 2019, real personal consumption expenditures, a major component of the GNP, increased by 5.6%, when compared to FY 2018. In net terms, this variable registered an increase of \$515.2 million. This variable is composed of, durable goods, nondurable goods and services. The share of each one as part of personal consumption expenditures in FY 2019 was 9.7%, 4.4% and 4.7%, respectively (Figure 4).

B. Puerto Rico: Price Movements of Top Exports and Other Highlights, July 2019 *


Figure 5 Top Puerto Rico Exports by Trade Dollar Value, 2019

Export price indexes for the United States include Puerto Rico and other U.S. territories. Total exports for Puerto Rico amounted to \$20.5 billion in 2019. That was a 13.3-percent increase from 2018, when exports totaled \$18.1 billion. Export prices for pharmaceuticals, medicine manufacturing, and medical equipment and supplies manufacturing declined from March to June. The price index for basic chemical manufacturing also decreased over the same period (Figure 5).

Top Puerto Rico Exports by Trade Dollar Value, 2019

- Puerto Rico was the leader in U.S. exports of pharmaceutical and medicine manufacturing during 2019, accounting for 24.6 percent of total U.S. exports.
- Medical equipment and supplies manufacturing was Puerto Rico's second largest export in 2019, representing 6.0 percent of total exports for the island.
- Puerto Rico's top 3 exports accounted for approximately 89.7 percent of the territory's total exports in 2019.

Top Six Exporting States and Territories for Pharmaceuticals and Medicine Manufacturing, 2019

- In 2019, the United States exported over \$66.7 billion of pharmaceuticals and medicine manufacturing products.
- Puerto Rico remained the top U.S. exporter of pharmaceuticals and medicine products in 2019.
- Puerto Rico's trade dollar value of export pharmaceuticals and medicine products was higher than the value, from the next 2 highest states, Indiana and California, combined. (Figure 6).

III. Population




Figure 7 Total Population and Net Change Population Estimates Year July 1, 2010 - 2019

According to U.S. Census Bureau statistics, the population of Puerto Rico has continued a downward trend that began in 2005. The reduction of the estimated population from 2010 to 2019 was of 527,831 inhabitants or 14.2%. The high level of migration and the falling birth rate help to explain the decline. When analyzing the Island's population in past years, we observe a considerable decrease after the hit of Hurricanes Irma and María in 2017. From 2016 to 2017, the decrease was 81,494 or 2.4%; from 2017 to 2018 the decrease was 129,848 or 3.9% and from 2018 to 2019 the decrease was 1,459 or 0.0% (Figure 7).

According to the annual estimate of the components of population, the net migration during July 1, 2017 to July 1, 2018 registered the highest loss with 123,399. However, the net migration between July 1, 2018 to July 1, 2019 registered a positive international migration with 7,773. When comparing the cumulative estimates of April 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019, the net migration losses were 557,518 (Births 297,601 and Deaths 272,546) (Table 2).




Figure 8 Annual Estimates of the Components of Population Change: Births and Deaths




Figure 9 Annual Estimates of Components of Population Change - Net Migration

A. Population by Age and Gender




Figure 10 Total Population and Population by Sex opulation Estimates Year July 1, 2010 - 2019

Analyzing the total population by sex, it may be observed that in 2019 there were 162,252 more females than males. Males represented 47.5% of the total population, while females were 52.5%. The male population fell by 267,061 when comparing 2019 with 2010, and decreased by 2,322 when comparing 2019 with 2018. The female population also showed a reduction of 260,770 when comparing 2019 with 2010, and increased by 863 when comparing 2019 with 2018. (Figure 10).




Figure 11 Population Estimates by Age Group and Sex Year 2019

The age groups of under 5 years of age to 20 to 24, had the highest number of males in 2019. All age groups from 25 - 29 to 85 years and over, registered more females. The age group with the highest number of females in 2019 was 85 years old and over, with a difference of 23,594. This was followed by the age group of 65 to 69 years, with a difference of 18,565, and 55 to 59 year with a difference of 18,546 (Figure 11).

The age group with more people in 2010 was the 15 to 19 years old (284,320), and in 2019 was the 25 to 29 years old (219,925). The age group with the most significant population loss was under 5 year of age with 107,331. However, the age group with the most noticeable increase was the 70 to 74 years old with 40,290. (Figure 12).




Figure 12 Compared Population by Age Group Population Estimates July 1, 2010 and 2019




Figure 13 Difference in Population by Age Group Population Estimates July 1, 2010 and 2019

All groups from the 65 to 69 to the 85 years old and over, showed increases in 2019. Being the opposite for all the age groups from under 5 years old to 60 to 64, which reflected reductions. The age group of 70 to 74 years old reflected the highest increase, followed by the age group 75 to 79. The age group under 5 years old registered the most significant loss (Figure 13).

The age group with the highest number of persons in 2018 was the 20 to 24 years old (218,350), and the 25 to 29 age group with 219,925 for 2019. The age group with the most significant population loss was the under 5 year old with 7,005. However, the age group with the most notorious gain was the 85 years old and over, with 5,036. (Figure 14).




Figure 14 Compared Population by Age Group Population Estimates July 1, 2018 and 2019




Figure 15 Difference in Population by Age Group Population Estimates July 1, 2018 and 2019

All groups from 25 to 29 years old to 30 to 34 and the age groups from 55 to 59 to the 85 years old and over, showed an increase in 2019. Being the opposite for the age groups under 5 years of age to the 20 to 24 years old and the age groups from 35 to 39 years old to the 50 to 54 which reflected reductions. The age group of 30 to 34 years old reflected the highest increase, followed by the age group of 85 and over. The age group of under 5 years of age registered the most significant loss (Figure 15).

B. Population Projections




Figure 16 **Projected Population Change**

Below are the population projections as presented in the Fiscal Plan for Puerto Rico^{1/}. During the past five years, Puerto Rico's population has trended downward by 1% to 2% every year, as residents have left to seek opportunities elsewhere. Birth rates have also declined continually (Figure 16).

This projection includes the latest available migration data and economic growth projections, as well as real-time estimates of population loss, since Hurricanes Irma and María, (e.g. net airplane departures). This trend accelerated after the hurricanes, while some are projected to return as the Island rebuilds. Population is still projected to decline by 0.93% by FY 2025.

C. Population by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL)

This section presents the population by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL, for its acronym in Spanish) under the WIOA Program. Table 3 presents the population of the 15 local areas and the municipalities they comprise. All the areas reflected losses in their population. From 2017 to 2018 the area of greatest loss was San Juan, followed by Norte Central-Arecibo and Noroeste.




Figure 17 Population Estimates by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Bayamón-Comerío July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019






Figure 18 Population Estimates by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Caguas-Guayama July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019




Figure 20 Population Estimates by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Guaynabo - Toa Baja July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019




Figure 21 Population Estimates by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), La Montaña July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019





Figure 22 Population Estimates by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Manatí-Dorado July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019




Figure 24 Population Estimates by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Noreste July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019




Figure 25 Population Estimates by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Noroeste July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019






Figure 26 Population Estimates by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Norte Central - Arecibo July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019




Figure 28 Population Estimates by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), San Juan July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019




Figure 29 Population Estimates by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Sur Central July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019




Figure 30 Population Estimates by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Sureste July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019




Figure 31 Population Estimates by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Suroeste July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2019




Figure 32 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Bayamón - Comerío July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019




Figure 33 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Caguas - Guayama July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019




Figure 34 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Carolina July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019




Figure 35 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Guaynabo - Toa Baja July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019




Figure 36 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), La Montaña July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019




Figure 37 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Manatí - Dorado July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019




Figure 38 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Mayagüez - Las Marías




Figure 39 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Noreste July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019




Figure 40 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Noroeste July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019




Figure 41 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Nortecentral - Arecibo




Figure 42 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Ponce July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019




Figure 43 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), San Juan July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019




Figure 44 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Sur Central




Figure 45 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Sureste July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019





Figure 46 Population by Age Group for the Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL), Suroeste July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019

IV. Labor Force, Employment and Unemployment^{1/}

A. Labor Force


In 2019, the labor force was estimated in 1,079,000 persons, and represented an increase of 1,000 persons or 0.1% when compared to 2018 (1,078,000). From 2009 to 2019, the labor force fell by 223,000 persons (Figure 47).

B. Employment

The seasonally adjusted number of employed persons (which includes self-employed individuals and agricultural employment) reached a total of 990,000 in 2019. This represented an increase of 11,000 employees in the local economy, when compared to 2018 (979,000) (Figure 48).

Self-employment not seasonally adjusted, in 2019 was 173,000 and reflected an increase of 9,000 persons or 5.5% of those totally employed, when compared to 2018 (164,000) (Figure 49).

C. Unemployment




Figure 51 Unemployment Rate, Seasonally Adjusted Calendar Years 2009 - 2019

In 2019, unemployed people (seasonally adjusted) totalized 88,000 and represented 11,000 unemployed less than in 2018 (99,000) (Figure 50). The unemployment rate (seasonally adjusted) for 2019 was 8.2%, 1.0 percentage points less than in 2018 (9.2%) (Figure 51).



The municipalities with the highest unemployment rate in 2019 were: Villalba, 15.8%, Patillas, 15.6%, Adjuntas, 15.3%, Maunabo, 15.0%, Guánica, 14.8%, Lares, 14.7%, Yauco, 14.6%, Salinas, 14.5%, Peñuelas, 14.1%, and Jayuya, 14.1%. Six of these ten municipalities are located in the southern coast of Puerto Rico (Patillas, Maunabo, Guánica, Yauco, Salinas, and Peñuelas) and four are in the central area (Villalba, Adjuntas, Lares, and Jayuya). Conversely, the municipalities close to the metropolitan area registered in 2019 the lowest unemployment rates, indicating that jobs and economic activity are concentrated in this area. These municipalities are the following: Guaynabo, 4.1%, Trujillo Alto, 4.9%, San Juan, 5.5%, Dorado, 5.7%, Gurabo, 5.7%, Toa Alta, 5.7%, Toa Baja, 5.8%, Carolina, 5.9%, and Bayamón, 6.3%. Nevertheless, the island-municipality of Culebra had 3.1%, the lowest in Puerto Rico (Figure 52).



D. Labor Force by Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL)

This section presents a labor force profile of each of the designated Local Workforce Development Areas (ALDL, for its acronym in Spanish) under WIOA Program. The Program divides Puerto Rico into 15 local areas, with a total of 78 municipalities (Figure 53) (Table 4).

1. Bayamón-Comerío

This area comprises only these two municipalities. In 2019 the labor force in this area registered an increase of 116 persons. The Bayamón municipality showed a rise of 152 and Comerío a reduction of 36. In terms of employment, the area added 520 employees between 2018 and 2019. From those, 485 were from Bayamón and 35 from Comerío. The number of unemployed persons showed a reduction of 404 persons. The unemployment rate in the area presented a reduction of 0.6 percentage points in the comparative period.

2. Caguas-Guayama

The eight municipalities that comprises this area are: Aguas Buenas, Aibonito, Arroyo, Caguas, Cayey, Guayama, Gurabo and Trujillo Alto. For 2019 the labor force in this area was estimated in 135,452 and represented a decrease of 274 persons. The employment for the area presented an increase of 856 persons. The number of unemployed persons totaled 9,782 and the unemployment rate fell from 8.0% to 7.2% from 2018 to 2019.

3. Carolina

Carolina is one of the few municipalities operating by itself as an ALDL under the WIOA Program. The labor force decreased from 60,555 to 60,399 representing a reduction of 157 persons between 2018 and 2019. Employment rose from 56,445 to 56,855 resulting in a gain of 410 employed persons. Unemployment for the area diminished from 4,111 to 3,544 persons and the unemployment rate dropped by 0.9 percentage points, from 6.8% in 2018 to 5.9% in 2019.

4. Guaynabo Toa - Baja

The area is composed of four municipalities: Cataño, Guaynabo, Toa Alta and Toa Baja. The labor force reflected a gain, from 2018 (99,735) to 99,898 in 2019, an increase of 164 persons. Guaynabo showed the most important rise with an increase of 223 persons. Likewise, the number of employed people for the area also showed a growth for the same period of 732 persons. In similar comparison, the number of unemployed persons and the unemployment rate presented reductions. The first one dropped by 568, and the unemployment rate dropped by 0.6 percentage points.

5. La Montaña

This area is composed of the municipalities of Barranquitas, Cidra, Corozal, Orocovis and Naranjito. It is characterized mainly for its diminished agricultural activity, and is located in the central mountainous sector of Puerto Rico. Its labor force for 2018 was 43,434 and 43,141 for 2019 representing a loss of 293 persons. Orocovis presented the most important fall with a loss of 96 persons. Employment in the area rose by 173. The number of unemployed people also declined from 4,040 to 3,574 between both years. The unemployment rate registered a reduction of 1.0 percentage points between both years.

6. Manatí - Dorado

This area is composed of eight municipalities: Barceloneta, Ciales, Dorado, Florida, Manatí, Morovis, Vega Alta and Vega Baja. This area presented a reduction in the labor force of 53 persons. Vega Baja showed the most important fall with a loss of 79 persons. Employment in this area totalized 61,265 in 2018 and 61,651 for 2019. The number of unemployed people reflected a drop of 440. In terms of the unemployment rate, it registered a reduction of 0.6 percentage points.

7. Mayaguez-Las Marías

This area is composed of only these two municipalities. Its labor force reflected a decrease of 338 persons. Mayaguez presented the most notable decrease with a loss of 344 persons. The employment sector showed a decrease of 48 persons from 2018 to 2019. The unemployed persons and the unemployment rate registered a reduction of 290 persons and 1.0 percentage points, respectively.

8. Noreste

This area is composed of nine municipalities: Canóvanas, Ceiba, Culebra, Fajardo, Loíza, Luquillo, Naguabo, Rio Grande, and Vieques. The labor force fell from 73,987 in 2018 to 72,713 in 2019 which meant 1,274 less persons in the labor force. An increase of 612 persons was registered in employment, from 66,177 in 2018 to 66,789 in 2019. The unemployed persons also diminished for the period in 2018, when there were 7,810 unemployed and 5,924 in 2019. This represented a reduction of 2.4 percentage points in the unemployment rate for that period.

9. Noroeste

This area is composed of seven municipalities: Aguada, Aguadilla, Añasco, Isabela, Moca, Rincón and San Sebastián. The labor force for the area was estimated at 72,964 for 2018 and in 72,240 in 2019. This meant a decrease of 724 persons. The employment for the area showed a rise of 326 employees. Unemployment descended by 1,050. The unemployment rate of the area fell from 11.9% in 2018 to 10.5% in 2019.

10. Norte Central - Arecibo

Eight municipalities comprise this area. These are: Adjuntas, Arecibo, Camuy, Hatillo, Jayuya, Lares Quebradillas and Utuado. Its labor force recorded an increase of 1,051 persons from 2018 (73,251) to 2019 (74,302). Arecibo, the most important rose with a gain of 476 persons. The number of employed persons increased from 64,568 in 2018 to 65,914 in 2019. The number of unemployed persons decreased in the 2018-2019 period, from 8,683 to 8,388, respectively, for a total reduction of 295 persons. The unemployment rate of the area diminished from 11.9% in 2018 to 11.3% in 2019.

11. Ponce

Ponce is another standalone ALDL with a labor force of 44,991 in 2019, representing a gain of 406 persons from 2018. Employment for the municipality rose by 433 persons. Unemployment registered 4,383 persons in 2018 and 4,357 in 2019, representing 27 less people unemployed when compared to 2018. The unemployment rate for the area decreased from 9.8% to 9.7%, a reduction of 0.1 percentage point.

12. San Juan

Like Carolina and Ponce, San Juan is the other standalone ALDL of the 15 workforce areas in Puerto Rico. In 2018 the labor force was estimated at 131,456 while in 2019 the number was 131,645, representing a growth of 189 from one year to the other. Employment was estimated at 124,372 for 2019, representing an increase of 1,124 employees. Total unemployment in the capital city had a reduction of 935 persons in 2019. The unemployment rate decreased by 0.7 percentage points.

13. Sur Central

This area is composed of five municipalities: Coamo, Juana Díaz, Salinas, Santa Isabel and Villalba. The labor force for the area was estimated at 47,732 for 2018, while for 2019 at 47,883. It represented an increase of 151 persons. Villalba showed the most important gain with increase of 95 persons. The number of employed people in the area was 42,044 in 2019. This represented an increase of 546 employees. Unemployment showed a reduction of 395 unemployed persons. The unemployment rate of the area fell from 13.1% in 2018 to 12.2% in 2019, a difference of 0.9 percentage point.

14. Sureste

Seven municipalities comprise this area. These are: Humacao, Juncos, Las Piedras, Maunabo, Patillas, San Lorenzo and Yabucoa. Its labor force showed a reduction of 414 persons from 2018 (67,856) to 2019 (67,442). Humacao showed the most important fall with a loss of 96 persons. The number of employed persons registered an increase of 437 persons. The number of unemployed persons decreased by 851. The unemployment rate for the area diminished from 11.5% to 10.3% or 1.2 percentage points for the years in discussion.

15. Suroeste

This is the ALDL encompassing the largest number of municipalities with 10 of them. They are: Cabo Rojo, Guánica, Guayanilla, Hormigueros, Lajas, Maricao, Peñuelas, Sabana Grande, San Germán and Yauco. The labor force for 2018 was estimated at 66,092 and 65,894 in 2019 for a decrease of 198 persons. Cabo Rojo showed the most important fall with a loss of 200 persons. The number of employed people in the area presented a rise of 466 persons. The number of unemployment persons showed a reduction of by 664, and the unemployment rate fell by 1.0 percentage points.





V. Employment by Industry

A. Current Employment Statistics Survey (CES)

In FY 2020 total nonfarm employment decreased by 14,900, mainly due to a significant loss in the following sectors: Trade, Transportation & Utilities (6,500); Professional & Business Services (5,100); Leisure & Hospitality (3,100); Mining, Logging & Construction (2,700); Government (600); Information (500); and Other Services (100). Only three industry sectors reflected job earnings during FY 2020: Education & Health Services (1,700); Financial Activities (1,100); and Manufacturing (900) (Figures 54-66).




Figure 55 Non Farm Employment by Major Industry Group (in thousands) Seasonally Adjusted - Fiscal Years 2019-2020

Figure 56 shows the composition of employment by industry in Puerto Rico for FY 2020. The Government industrial sector continues to be the largest employer with 203,200 jobs, followed by Trade, Transportation, and Utilities with 166, 500; and Education & Health Service with 119,300 jobs.





Employment in Mining, Logging & Construction declined by 2,700 in FY 2020. Of these, Mining and Logging remain the same by 100 jobs. Construction employment decreased by 2,700 jobs, with a job loss of 1,900 jobs, in the principal sub-sector of Construction of Buildings.


Employment in Manufacturing increased by 900 jobs in FY 2020. Durable goods added 200 jobs, while employment in non-durable goods added 600 jobs. Within durable goods, Computer and Electronic Product Manufacturing won 200 jobs; followed by Fabricated Metal Product Manufacturing with a gain of 100 jobs. Within non-durable goods, the subsector of Apparel Manufacturing added 1,100 jobs in FY 2020.

Employment in Trade, Transportation, and Utilities decreased in FY 2020 by 6,500 jobs. Retail Trade had the most significant loss with 7,200 jobs mainly losses in General Merchandise Stores with 3,500 jobs, followed by Clothing and Clothing Accessories Stores with 2,000 jobs. While, employment in Transportation, Warehousing and Utilities won 700 jobs and Wholesale Trade lost 100 jobs in FY 2019.




Employment in the Information sector had a subtle decrease in FY 2020, with a loss of 500 jobs.




Figure 60 Non Farm Employment: Information (in thousands) Seasonally Adjusted - Fiscal Years 2010-2020



Employment in Financial Activities increased by 1,100 jobs in FY 2020, due to a gain in the subsectors of Finance and Insurance by 600 jobs, and Real Estate & Rental and Leasing with 400 jobs.






Employment in the supersector of Professional and Business Services registered a total of 118,600 jobs in FY 2020 representing losses of 5,100 jobs. Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services increased by 1,000 jobs in this subsector, and losses of 5,700 jobs in the subsector of Administrative and Support, and Waste Management and Remediation Services.



Employment in Education & Health Services showed an increase of 1,700 jobs in FY 2020, mainly due to the gain in the subsectors of Health Care and Social Assistance by 1,000 jobs, and Educational Service with 700 jobs.




Figure 65 Non Farm Employment: Other Services (in thousands) Seasonally Adjusted - Fiscal Years 2010-2020



Of all industries, the Government supersector was the only one that showed a constant decrease by 600 jobs in FY 2020. Of these, the State Government subsector lost 3,500 jobs. However, the Local Government subsector gained 1,100 jobs and the Federal Government subsector gained 1,800 jobs in FY 2020. The significant decline in state government is due, in part, to the loss of 3,900 jobs in the state government Educational Services industry. However, State Government Excluding Education gained 600 jobs.

VI. Business Employment Dynamics (BED)

A. Trends in Gross Job Gains and Job Losses

Opening and expanding private sector business establishments in Puerto Rico gained 37,232 jobs in the fourth quarter 2019. This represents a decrease of 4,438 from the previous quarter. Over the quarter, expanding establishments added 30,916 jobs, while opening establishments added 6,316. (Table 5).

Gross job losses totaled 33,897 in the fourth quarter of 2019, an decrease of 3,656 from the third quarter of 2019. This was the second decrease in gross job losses since June of 2019. In the fourth quarter of 2019, contracting establishments lost 27,535 jobs, while closing establishments accounted for a loss of 6,362.

From October to December 2019, gross job gains represented 5.4 percent of private sector employment and gross job losses represented 4.9 percent of private sector employment, according to preliminary data released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U.S. Department of Labor. This is less than the national rate of gross job gains (6.2 percent) and less for job losses (5.6 percent). The number of job gains from opening and expanding establishments was 37,232 and the number of job losses from closing and contracting establishments was 33,897. Expanding and contracting establishments accounted for most of the jobs gained and lost.

B. Rates of Gross Job Gains and Gross Job Losses

From October to December 2019, gross job gains represented 5.4 percent of private sector employment. Over the quarter, gross job gains at expanding establishments represented 4.5 percent of private sector employment, and gross job gains at opening establishments represented 0.9 percent. Nationally, these quarter gross job gains at expanding establishments represented 5.0 percent of the private sector employment, and at opening establishments it represented 1.2 percent.

For the same period, gross job losses represented 4.9 percent of private sector employment. Gross job losses at contracting establishments represented 4.0 percent of the private sector employment. The national rate at contracting establishments was 4.5 percent. The rate of gross job losses at closing establishments was 0.9 for Puerto Rico, and 1.1 percent for the United States. (Table 6).

C. Number of Establishments Gaining and Losing Employment

Another way to observe the dynamics of employment change is to count the number of establishments that opened, closed, expanded, or contracted during the quarter. Out of 45,753 active private sector establishments, a total of 9,002 gained jobs from October to December 2019 (See table C). Of these, 7,709 were expanding establishments and 1,293 were opening establishments. During the fourth quarter of 2019, 9,038 establishments showed job losses. Of these, 7,742 were contracting establishments and 1,296 were closing establishments (Table 7).

D. Establishment Births and Deaths

From October to December 2019, a total of 964 new private sector, non-farm businesses created 4,603 jobs. This represented a decrease of 117 establishment births from the prior quarter, and a loss of 1,735 jobs. Job gains from these new establishments represented 0.7 percent of total employment births. The historical time series of birth data shows that the number of establishment births has remained around 900 every quarter, with the exception of the third quarter of 2017 which was lower.

Technical Note

Business Employment Dynamics (BED) data is a product of a federal-state cooperative program known as the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW). BED data is compiled by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) from existing quarterly state unemployment insurance (UI) records. Most employers in the U.S. are required to file quarterly reports on employment and wages of workers covered by UI laws, and pay quarterly UI taxes. Quarterly UI reports are sent by the State Employment Security Agencies (SESAs) to the BLS and form the basis for the Bureau's establishment sampling frame universe. These reports are also used to produce the quarterly QCEW data on total employment and wages, and the longitudinal BED data on gross job gains and losses. Other important uses for the Bureau's UI records are linked across quarters to provide a longitudinal history of each establishment. The linkage process allows for the establishment level, which in turn allows for the estimation of jobs gained at opening, expanding units, and jobs lost at closing and contracting units.

VII. Occupational Employment Survey (OES)

A. Occupational Employment and Wage Estimates 2019


According to the Occupational Employment Survey, the estimated employment for 2019 was 865,160. The hourly mean wage was \$14.27 and the hourly median wage was \$10.13. In terms of employment and wages by a major occupational group, the Office and Administrative Support Occupations had the highest employment with 138,140. The hourly mean and median wage for this group was \$12.38 and \$10.33, respectively. Other occupational groups that stand out in terms of employment were, Sales and Related Occupations, 103,140 workers; Food Preparations and Serving Related Occupations, 69,940 workers; Educational Instruction and Library Occupations, 63,560 workers; Transportation and Material Moving Occupations, 62,810 workers; and Production Occupations, 57,630 workers (Table 8) (Figures 68-69).



The location quotient is valuable to know because it shows how concentrated an occupational employment in a region is as compared to the national average. A location quotient greater than one indicates that the occupation has a higher share of employment than average. A location quotient less than one indicates that the occupation is less prevalent in the area than the average (Figure 70).

In May of 2019, the average hourly wage for nonSTEM occupations in Puerto Rico was \$13.75 while STEM occupations reached an average of \$25.59. The average annual wage for nonSTEM occupations was \$28,600, while STEM occupations reached an average of \$53,230. Among the STEM occupations, Architectural and Engineering Managers reached the highest average salary of \$48.55 (Figure 72).

B. Employment by Typical Education Level

Occupations that typically require *postsecondary education* for entry level, made up 31.8% of employment. The largest postsecondary category, or occupations that typically requires a *bachelor's degree* for entry, made up 19.5% of employment. This educational category includes registered nurses, teachers kindergarten through secondary levels, and many management, business and financial operations, computer, and engineering occupations, among others.

Occupations that typically require a *high school diploma* or the equivalent for entry level made up 42.5% of employment, and occupations that require *no formal educational credential* for entry made up 25.7% of employment. These two educational categories include most production and construction occupations, as well as many occupations such as, retail salespersons, cashiers, and general office clerks.




Figure 74 Percent of Employment by Typical Education Level, 2019

Occupations that typically require a *postsecondary nondegree award*, such as a certificate, for entry level made up 4.1% of employment. (Figure 74).




Figure 75 Employment by Typical Education Level, 2019

More technical and advanced jobs, including those in research, usually require a master's or doctoral degree. But STEM isn't only for people who have a bachelor's or graduate degree. 




Figure 76 STEM vs. Non STEM Occupations by Education Levels, 2019





Figure 80 Top 10 Highest Employment Occupations that ypically require High School Diploma or Equivalent, 2019


Figure 81 Top 10 Highest Employment Occupations that Typically Not require Formal Educational Credential, 2019

Figure 82 Top 10 STEM Highest Employment Occupations that Typically require Master's, Doctoral or Professional Degree, 2019







Figure 84 Top 10 STEM Highest Employment Occupations that Typically require Associate's Degree and Some College, No Degree, 2019






Figure 86 Top 10 Highest Paying Occupations that typically require Master's, Doctoral or Professional Degree, 2019

Figure 88 **Top 10 Highest Paying Occupations that**






Figure 90 Top 10 Highest Paying Occupations that Typically Not require Formal Educational Credential, 2019

VIII. Occupational Skills & Research

This section contains the results of the Occupational Skills and Research Survey of the Puerto Rico Bureau of Labor Statistics and presents skills on demand by employers in Puerto Rico. Of the entire group of employers surveyed, 37.3% informed that they had recruited at least one new employee between April of 2017 and March of 2018. Of the recruited employees, 28.5% were not required any specific level of education. However, 29.1% of those recruited had a high school diploma or its equivalent, while 27.3% had a Bachelor's degree.

A. Rate of Overqualification




Figure 91 Top 10 Industries with Highest Rate of Overqualification - 2018

The rate of overqualification, equivalent to the percent of the recruited employees who had a higher level of education than required for the vacancy, reached 43.4%. This rate reflected an increase of 2.5 percentage points when compared with the previous year (40.9%). The industries with the highest rate of overqualification was the Information industry, where 85.3% of the recruited employees had more education that the one required for the job vacancy, followed by Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation with 81.3% (Figure 91).

B. Hiring and Separation Rate

The Hiring Rate for March of 2018 was 1.8%, and the Separation Rate was 2.0%. While for March of 2017, the rates were, 1.8% and 1.6%, respectively. In March of 2018, 16.8% of the employees were part-time workers (less than 28 hours per week). For the same month of 2017, it was 19.0%. The employers surveyed indicated that they offered their employees the followings marginal benefits, a health plan, 22.4%; productivity bonus, 14.0%; retirement plan, 12.8%; life insurance, 12.4%; and more than 15 days of vacation, 11.5%.



D. Vacancy rate

The Vacancy Rate, defined as the number of vacancies at the moment of answering the questionnaire, as a percent of total employment, was 6.4%. This rate reflected a decrease of 2.5 percentage points when compared to the previous year (8.9%). In terms of total reporting employers that answered the questionnaire, 12.9% informed that they had vacancies; and of these, 54.6% had difficulty filling them.

The highest vacancy rate corresponded to the Transportation and Warehousing industry with 49.3%, followed by Agriculture and Mining with 27.0%. Among the establishments that reported having vacancies for new positions, the industries of Administrative and Support Services (60.2%); and Construction (59.6%) registered the highest percentage of vacancies. During the previous year, the industries with the highest percentage of vacancies for new positions were Wholesale Trade (62.9%) and Information (49.1%).




Figure 94 Top 10 Occupations with the Rate of Vacancies Hardest to Fill - 2018

The Other Services, and Agriculture and Mining industries had the highest percentage of establishment with vacancies difficult to fill with 89.3% and 86.6%, respectively. In 2017, the Manufacturing and Construction industry was the one that reported the highest percentage of establishment with vacancies difficult to fill. In terms of occupations, Farmworkers and Laborers, Crop, Nursery, and Greenhouse (5.3%) and Cooks, Fast Food (3.0%) reflected the highest percentage of vacancies difficult to fill (Figure 94).

IX. Long Term Industry Projections 2018 - 2028

A.Employment by Industry





Figure 95 Net Change in Employment by Major Industry Sector

Employment by industry is projected to decrease 6,896 over the 2018-2028 decade. This decrease is caused mainly by the drop of 7.28% of the jobs in the Good-Producing Industries sector. The sector with the highest gain was Health Care and Social Assistance with 14,812 jobs. Of these, 8,070 jobs are in the Ambulatory Health Care Services industry. Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services; Accommodation and Food Services; Retail Trade; and Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services follow as the industry sectors with the highest increment in 2028. Service-providing industries are Wholesale and Retail Trade; Transportation and Warehousing; Utilities; Information; Financial Activities; Professional and Business Services; Education and Health Services; Leisure and Hospitality; Other Services; and Government. The most significant job loss is in the Government sector with 26,258, of these, 19,028, are in the State Government sector (Figure 95).

The Goods Producing industries are expected to have job losses of 7,892. Manufacturing and Agricultural industries are expected to decrease by 6,521 and 1,014 jobs, respectively in 2028. The major industry sectors Construction; and Mining, Quarrying, and Oil and Gas Extraction are expected to have a decrease of 254 and 103 jobs for 2028.

Figure 96 shows the projected percentage change of the jobs that are expected to be added or lost in each industry for the 2018-2028 period. The Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation sector and, Utilities sector are projected to grow 28.53% and 25.70%, respectively.








Figure 97 Most New Jobs - Net Growth in Employment by Detailed Industry Projected 2018-2028



Figure 97 presents the industries that are projected to add more new jobs between 2018 and 2028. Administrative and Support Services is the industry with the highest projected employment (8,092). This subsector engages in activities that support the day-to-day operations of other organizations. The processes employed in this sector (e.g., general management, personnel administration, clerical activities, cleaning activities) are often integral parts of the activities of establishments found in all sectors of the economy. Industries in the Health Care sector and Social Assistance such as: Ambulatory Health Care Services are expected to gain the most new jobs. This subsector provides health care services directly or indirectly to ambulatory patients, and does not usually provide inpatient services. Health practitioners in this subsector provide outpatient services, with the facilities and equipment not usually being the most significant part of the production process.

Figure 98 shows how fast industries are expected to add jobs over the 2018-2028 decade. The top industry is Transit and Ground Passenger Transportation with 56.11%. This subsector includes a variety of passenger transportation activities, such as urban transit systems; chartered buses, school buses, and interurban bus transportation; and taxis. These activities have notoriety because they are based primarily on such production process factors as vehicle types, routes, and schedules.

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


Figure 99 Most Job Losses - Net decline in Employment of Workers by Detailed Industry Projected 2018-2028

The most declining industries are related to Manufacturing, expecting 6,521 less jobs in 2028. The industries with the largest job losses were State Government with 19,028 less jobs, and Educational Service with 13,475 less jobs in 2028. These industries have been declining since 2006 due to Puerto Rico's economic restructuring (Figure 99).




Figure 100 Numeric Change in Employment by Major Occupational Group Projected 2018-2028

The projected numeric change in employment is the number of new jobs expected to be added to each major occupational group between 2018 and 2028. The group with the highest increase is the Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations group with 6,302 new jobs for 2028, mainly due to the increase of the occupation of Registered Nurses with 2,693 new jobs. The major occupational group that is projected to decrease is the Office and Administrative Support group with 8,610 jobs in 2028. Mainly due to the decrease of the occupations of Executive Secretaries and Executive Administrative Assistants with -2,512 jobs; Office Clerks, General with –2,198 jobs; and Secretaries and Administrative Assistants, Except Legal, Medical, and Executive with –1,877 jobs (Figure 100).




Figure 101 Percent Change in Employment by Major Occupational Group Projected 2018-2028

The projected percent change in employment measures the rate of expected growth or decline for each major occupational group between 2018 and 2028. The occupational group with the highest projected growth is the Healthcare Support group, mainly due to the increase of Dental Assistants with 2,268 jobs and Home Health Aides with 2,224 jobs. The major group where a reduction is the expected is Education, Training, and Library Occupations with 11.77% in 2028, mainly due to a decrease in the occupation of Elementary School Teachers, Except Special Education with –1,679 jobs; and Secondary School Teachers, Except Special and Career/Technical Education with –1,168 jobs (Figure 101).




Figure 102 Jobs Annual Openings by Major Occupational Group Projected 2018-2028




Figure 103 Most New Jobs - Net Growth in Employment Projected 2018-2028




Figure 104 Fastest Growing Occupations - Percent Growth in Employment Projected 2018-2028

All Together, the 25 occupations showed in Figure 105 are expected to add about 52,875 jobs. These occupations are projected to have the most annual job openings due to: projected exits of workers who leave an occupation and leave the labor force; projected number of workers leaving an occupation and transferring to a different occupation; and the number of jobs in an occupation expected to gain or lose within the period from 2018 to 2028. Many of the expected jobs are in service-related occupations, projected to have numerous openings over the 2018-28 decade.





Figure 106 Declining Occupations by Net Growth Projected 2018-2028




Figure 108 **Total Jobs Openings by Educational Level - Percent of Employment**





Figure 109 Master's, Doctoral or Professional Degree Gaining the Most New Jobs Projected 2018-2028




Figure 111 Bachelor's Degree Gaining the Most New Jobs Projected 2018-2028

Figure 112 Bachelor's Degree Occupations with the Highest Growth Rates Projected 2018-2028








Figure 113 Bachelor's Degree Most Annual Openings Occupations Projected 2018-2028




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


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Figure 117 Occupations Requiring a High School Diploma or Equivalent Gaining the Most New Jobs Projected 2018-2028

Figure 118 Occupations Requiring a High School Diploma or Equivalent with the Highest Growth Rates Projected 2018-2028







Figure 119 Occupations Requiring a High School Diploma or Equivalent Most Annual Openings



Figure 122 Most Annual Openings Occupations that not Require Formal Education Credentials Projected 2018-2028





Figure 123 Occupations related to Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics - (STEM) Gaining the Most New Jobs 2018-2028






Figure 124 Occupations related to Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics - (STEM) With the Highest Growth Rates 2018-2028




Figure 126 Most required Skills in Total Openings Occupations 2018-2028




Figure 127 Occupations related to Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics - (STEM) Most required Skills in Total Openings Occupations 2018-2028




Figure 128 Most required Knowledge's in Total Openings Occupations 2018-2028

X. Weekly Claims for Unemployment Insurance Data & Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed

A. Weekly Claims for Unemployment Insurance Data

The Unemployment Insurance weekly claims data is used in current economic analysis of unemployment trends in the nation, and states. Initial claims measure emerging unemployment and continued weeks claim measure the number of persons claiming unemployment benefits.

- Initial Claims An initial claim is a claim filed by an unemployed individual after a separation from an employer. The claimant requests a determination of basic eligibility for the UI program. When an initial claim is filed with a state, certain programmatic activities take place resulting in activity counts including the count of initial claims.
- Continued Weeks Claimed A person who has already filed an initial claim and experienced a week of unemployment files a continued claim, to claim benefits for that week of unemployment. Continued claims are also referred to as insured unemployment.


In mid-March, the government of Puerto Rico issued Executive Order number OE-2020-023 that contemplated the closure of both the government and private companies. It then issued other executive orders that were gradually opening and changing the measures to address the situation of the COVID -19 pandemic. Below are the data of the unemployment claims filed per week, that include the months that comprise the fiscal year 2019 and 2020.


The week ending on 4/4/20 was the week when more initial claims were reported in Puerto Rico with 66,555 claims, in comparison with the week when Hurricane Maria claims were reported on the week ending 4/11/2017 with 8,281 claims.

Comparing the week ending 3/23/2019 with the week ending 3/21/2020, when the lockdown started due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the results were the following: Initial claims were 1,002 to 20,148, a rise in 19,146 more claims; continued claims were 15,503 to 19,230, a rise in 3,727 more claims; and the insured unemployment rate was 1.84% to 2.26%, rise in 0.42%.

Comparing the week ending 3/30/2019 with the week ending 3/28/2020 when the lockdown started due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the results were the following: Initial claims were 1,148 to 45,394, a rise in 44,246 more claims; continued claims were 15,524 to 49,669, a rise in 34,145 more claims; and the insured unemployment rate was 1.85% to 5.83%, a rise in 3.98%.

Comparing the week ending in 4/6/2019 with the week ending 4/4/2020 when the lockdown started due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the results were the following: Initial claims were 1,163 to 66,555, a rise in 65,392 more claims; continued claims were 14,997 to 86,474, a rise in 71,477 more claims; and the insured unemployment rate was 1.79% to 10.10%, rise in 8.31%.




Figure 130 Initial Claims - Not Seasonally Adjusted Filed Week Ended - 3/21/2020 to 6/27/2020




Figure 131 Continued Claims - Not Seasonally Adjusted Filed Week Ended for the Fiscal Year 2019 - 2020




Figure 132 Continued Claims - Not Seasonally Adjusted Reflecting Week Ended - 3/28/2020 to 6/27/2020




Figure 133 **Insured Unemployment Rate - Not Seasonally Adjusted** Filed Week Ended for the Fiscal Year 2019 - 2020



A. Weekly Claims for Unemployment Insurance Data

The **Unemployment Insurance weekly claims** data are used in current economic analysis of unemployment trends. Initial claims measure emerging unemployment. Continued weeks claimed measure the number of persons claiming unemployment benefits. This monthly report is due in the National Office by the 20th of the month, following the month to which the data relates. The survey week is to coincide with the survey week for the Bureau of Labor Statistics' Current Population Survey (CPS) week. This usually represents weeks claimed, filed during the week containing the 19th of the month. The week containing the 19th of the month is assumed to reflect unemployment experienced during the prior week containing the 12th of the month, the CPS survey week. When the CPS survey week is altered due to holidays, etc., the week used for the ETA 203 Report should be altered accordingly.

Insured Unemployed for this report, the number of insured unemployed, is the amount of regular state UI continued weeks claimed, both intrastate and interstate. The total count for the insured unemployed is not reported on the ETA 203 but rather, the counts for demographic subcategories are reported. The sum of any given category, such as age groups, should generally be identical with the total for insured unemployed as reported on the ETA 539 report for state UI adjusted continued weeks claimed (CW) for the same week. Continued weeks claimed, under the Extended Benefit (EB) program, State Additional Benefits Program (AB), or any other extended compensation program should not be included on the ETA 203.

Industry coding will follow the most recent edition of the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS). Whenever possible, the industry assigned should be that of the employer for whom the claimant last worked. If it is not feasible to obtain the industry code of the most recent employer, the major base period employer may be substituted. Interstate claimants should be classified according to the best information available in the agent state.

Occupation codes will follow the most recent revision of the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC).

According to the COVID-19 pandemic, in Puerto Rico there was a total lockdown in mid-March, but some industries continue to open little by little. Below are the characteristics of the unemployed for the months that comprise fiscal year 2019 and 2020.

The months of April, May and June of fiscal year 2020 reflected the largest number of claimants due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Comparing April 2019 to 2020, We observed that there were 44,499 additional male claimants and 46,711 additional women claimants. In comparing May from 2019 to

2020, we observed that there were 112,858 more male claimants and 99,877 more women claimants. In comparing June from 2019 to 2020, we observed that there were 166,817 more male claimants and 138,511 more women claimants.




Figure 135 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Gender





Figure 136 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Age Group - April 2019 and 2020

Figure 138 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Age Group - June 2019 and 2020




Figure 139 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Age Group <22

Figure 141 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Age Group 25-34




Figure 142 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Age Group 35-44





Figure 143 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Age Group 45-54




Figure 144 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Age Group 55-59






Figure 146 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Age Group >=65




Figure 148 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Age Group - April 2019 and 2020




Figure 149 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Age Group - May 2019 and 2020





Figure 150 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Age Group - June 2019 and 2020

Figure 151 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Industry Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting





Figure 152 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Industry Mining









Figure 158 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Industry Information

Figure 159 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Industry Finance & Insurance






Figure 160 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Industry Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services

Figure 163 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Industry Educational Services






Figure 164 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Industry Health Care & Social Assistance





Figure 165 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Industry Arts, Entertainment & Recreation




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Figure 166 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Industry Accommodation and Food Services





Figure 167 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Industry Other Services (except Public Administration)










Figure 171 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group - May 2019 and 2020




Figure 172 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Age Group - June 2019 and 2020

Figure 173 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Management





Figure 174 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Business and Financial Operations

Figure 175 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Computer and Mathematical






Figure 176 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Architecture & Engineering





Figure 177 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Life, Physical & Social Sciences

Figure 178 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Community & Social Services




Figure 179 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Legal






Figure 180 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Education, Training & Library

Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Arts, Design, Entertainment Sports & Media




Figure 182 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Healthcare Practitioner & Technical





Figure 183 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Healthcare Support






Figure 186 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Building and Grounds Cleaning and Maintenance





Figure 187 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Personal Care & Services




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Figure 188 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Sales & Related





Figure 190 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Farming, Fishing & Forestry









Figure 192 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Installation, Maintenance & Repair

Figure 193 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Production






Figure 194 Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed - Claims by Occupational Group Transportation & Material Moving




